PODIATRY CLINIC – GOOD NEWS!

For all the participants in this clinic: we have had such great response from people signing up for this program that we have researched adjusting the cost of each appointment. The Town Select Board has agreed to let us defray the cost of this service through a grant that we received. As of January 20, the cost per person has been lowered from \$28 to \$15, payable to the nurse. The grant will pay the remaining \$13 per person.

IN SYMPATHY...



We are sorry to note the passing of **RAYOND** "**RAY' MOULTON** who passed away at the Lutheran Rehab and Skilled Care

Center on Jan. 15, his wife Sheryl by his side. He was 78.

He was born in Southbridge, raised in Charlton, and joined the Navy after high school. He trained as an electrician and after his discharge, worked for 36 years at NE Telephone. He was a lineman, cable splicer, supervisor, and member of the "Killer Bees", an elite, innovative group of communications system operators at the company. But Ray had another life as an outdoorsman. He learned to hunt and fish at his father's side. Later, he traveled all over North America tracking wild game, from turkeys to caribou to bear. He was a competitive archer, winning "Champion Archer of New England" for bagging the biggest black bear ever with a bow in Massachusetts. He learned to shoot film and began Creative Video Productions with a friend. Soon he was filming professional hunters on the Wildlife TV network, and later for Bass Pro Shops.

He also excelled as a water skier on Glen Echo Lake in Charlton and traveled the East Coast with the Springfield Motorcycle Club, winning trophies for enduro races. He was a good skier, staying at it into his 70's. In later years, after he came to Oakham, he had his flower and vegetable garden, including a plot for deer, and kept his binoculars handy. He was a good storyteller and certainly had good stories to tell. He made the most of life.



We are further saddened to report the passing of **Robert Phoenix, Jr.** age 65. Robert grew up in Oakham, attended Quabbin Jr/Sr.

High School, and then Worcester State College/University, where he earned his Bachelors and Masters degrees. He worked as a computer programmer for several companies and pursued a lifelong proclivity for puzzles: crosswords, sudokus, word searches, and such. He was adept at board games and games and Nintendo, and a whiz at Wheel of Fortune and Jeopardy. He was also a card shark. Clearly, one smart individual. Robert was also a film buff and enjoyed going to Boston and New York to enjoy Broadway shows. He was a frequent traveler, here and abroad. An interesting man.

Robert left a lot of family in town and around: his sisters Liz Sisco and Mary Brenda Phoenix, and their kids -- his nieces and nephews; as well as cousins, uncles, and aunts from both the Phoenix and Bechan clans, with roots here in Oakham. His parents, Bob and Phyllis, and his brother William predeceased him, Phyllis only this past July. We'll miss him.



We also want to commemorate the tragic loss of **MEGAN K. OLIVER** who died peacefully at Mass General in Boston on Jan. 23. She was only

34 years old.

She grew up in Worcester and lived in Charlton, but has close family here in Oakham: her parents, Richard and Robin Oliver, her grandmother, Marcia Dwelly, and other extended family. She was a veterinary tech. and an assistant manager at the Barkwood Inn Pet Resort in Charlton. She loved greyhounds. Megan was loved herself and will be sadly missed. Our deepest sympathies to the family.

And finally, we've gotten word at press-time that our friend, Claudia Lacerte, of Flint Rd., has died. We hope to have details next time.

Last time, we played "Glow Worm" by the Mills Brothers and "Kiss of Fire" by Georgia Gibbs, from 1952. The Mills Brothers were the first and best of the a cappella vocal groups and the inspiration for later doo wop. Georgia Gibbs, one of the top singers of the Golden Age of Pop Music, was born Frieda Lipschitz to a single mother in Worcester, MA. While her mother was away working, she'd be home with only the radio to keep her company. She had a couple of #1 hits covering songs by black artists, made appearances on Ed Sullivan and other TV and radio shows and was quite popular – until rock and roll came along...

Another artist some may not be familiar with, though huge in his day, is Guy Mitchell. He sold 44 million records, had a couple #1's, had his own TV show – but he got lost in Elvis' shadow and was soon forgotten.
