PEN PALS: CIRCLE JUNE 8!



We sadly note the passing of **Leonard Sansoucy** of Gaffney Road on April 16. Len was



born in Holyoke, grew up in Chicopee, and enlisted in the Army after high school. He was an MP in Heidelberg, Germany, and after his discharge he joined the Campus

Security team at Mt. Holyoke College. Pursuing his passion for law enforcement, he joined the Mass. State Police in 1986. He was an undercover narc, worked computer forensics with the 9/11 team, taught at the Academy, and cruised the Turnpike till retirement in 2013.

He enjoyed hunting and archery, traveling, and earth moving with his Kubota tractor. He also enjoyed making wine, listening to opera (he once let a speeder go because she was listening to Puccini), and reading, which his sister Carol encouraged as a child. He raised his children to be readers and over the last several years they formed a Zoom book club to enjoy reading together.

Len was a lifelong Red Sox fan, and on Lou Gehrig Day 2022, he threw the first pitch, thanks to Compassionate Care ALS, which works with victims of ALS - Lou Gehrig Disease – from which he died.
