WHAT'S "MAY DAY"?

May Day has its roots in ancient pagan festivals that celebrated the arrival of spring, fertility, and new growth. These festivals were held throughout Europe and included traditions like dancing around a maypole, crowning a May Queen, and lighting bonfires.

Over time, these pagan celebrations were adapted by Christian churches and became associated with the feast day of St. Walpurga, a Christian saint (canonized on May 1), known for her healing powers.

In the late 19th century, May Day became associated with the labor movement and the

struggle for workers' rights. In 1886, labor unions in the United States organized a general strike to demand an eight-hour workday. On May 1st of that year, thousands of workers went on strike in Chicago, provoking what became known as the Haymarket Massacre after a violent brawl and a bomb thrown at police left 8 dead.

Despite this horrific event, May Day continued to be associated with the labor movement, and it became an important day of protest and solidarity for workers around the world. In 1889, the International Socialist Congress declared May 1st as International Workers' Day, and the holiday is now observed in many countries as a day to honor workers and to call attention to issues facing working people. In the US, we celebrate Labor Day instead, and use "mayday" as a distress call.
